



About us

Our origins date back to 1655 when a group of clergy sons gathered for a service in St Paul's Cathedral and a collection was taken for the destitute families of priests dispossessed of their livings under Oliver Cromwell. The charity received a Royal Charter from Charles II in 1678. We have since grown by the amalgamation of various clergy support bodies and today we are the largest UK charity focused exclusively on supporting Anglican clergy families. We are widely known for our annual Festival Service which still takes place at St Paul's each year.



Our mission

Our mission is to support serving and retired Anglican clergy families and their dependants in times of hardship. Our main way of doing this at present is to provide one-off financial grants to eligible households for whom the clergy stipend or other sources of income are, in particular situations, inadequate.



Our impact

A recent impact study undertaken for us by NCVO indicated that our grants made a substantial difference in the lives of our beneficiaries. Over a third of those surveyed said they could not have coped without the financial support they had received from the charity. We no longer provide grants for specific purposes, but nearly half of the serving clergy who receive our gifts use the money to take their family on holiday. Retired clergy, widows and ex-spouses most frequently put the gift towards paying utility bills.






2016 grants awarded





2016 expenditure




Extra money has eased the tensions in our family life which have been quite significant during these teenage years which include managing depression and autism.

Eligible groups


We provide help to the following groups in times of poverty, hardship or illness:
